Digital announces VT320 terminal, LJ250 printer

Digital has announced the VT320 text terminal, the lowest-priced video terminal in the VT300 terminal family. The new terminal, which will replace the popular VT220 text unit, includes all the features of its predecessor plus significant enhancements, and is priced more than 30 percent lower.

The VT320 terminal enhancements include a higher-resolution 14-inch, flat-surfaced monochrome video display that includes a "paper-white" phosphor option in addition to green and amber displays. The terminal uses a high-quality font design for its characters, and has enhanced keyboard features. It is completely compatible with Digital's DECconnect modular office wiring system, as well as with existing application software programmed for VT100 and VT220 terminals.

The VT320 text terminal employs character-cell display, differentiating it from the VT340 and VT341 terminals, which have full graphics capability. A 25th display line has been added to inform users of the status of either the terminal or the host application.

According to Don Murphy, manager, Video Products, the VT320 terminal has been designed to provide users with the optimum desired features of a text video terminal at a highly competitive price. "This new terminal is the latest step in a trend-setting evolution of video units," says Don. "The VT100 family of terminals set a standard for the computer industry until Digital advanced that standard by introducing the VT200 terminal series. The VT220 text terminals have been Digital's most popular terminals, with more than one million manufactured. The VT320 terminal extends that standard further and doubtless will be used for a basis of comparison to other video terminals

throughout the industry."

The VT320 terminal is priced at \$545, and includes a one-year warranty. Quantity discounts are available, as is special pricing if the terminals are purchased with a system. Shipments are scheduled for October.

Digital also has announced new low-priced color non-impact printers for use with its computers and other systems. The serial-interface LJ250 companion color printer and the parallel-interface LJ252 printer are both desktop companion printers that can output text and graphics to paper or transparencies. They are suited for use with video ter-

minals, personal computers, and workstations.

The new printers can be used with Digital's VAX, VAXmate, and MicroVAX computers, including the recently announced MicroVAX 2000 system, and VAXstation workstations. In addition, they can be used with IBM PC computers and PC-compatible systems operating under the MS-DOS® operating system. Typical applications for the new printers include business graphics and engineering/scientific operations.

The printers' graphics employ ANSI sixels and color protocols, and print ReGIS graphics files via a host-resident RETOS software, available from Digital. It also supports HP-PCL® protocol for personal computer applications.

U.S. deliveries of the LJ250 printer are scheduled for October, and European deliveries in November. A one-year warranty is included.

Digital awards \$5 million equipment grant to Massachusetts Microelectronics Center

Digital has awarded a \$5 million grant to the Massachusetts Microelectronics Center (MMC), a cooperative education venture among industry, education, and government. The equipment grant will be used to educate scientists, students and engineers in state-of-the-art semiconductor technologies.

The donation consists of several large VAX computers for large computing tasks, graphics workstations for semiconductor chip design, and communications equipment.

Digital announces VAX enhancements, price adjustments

Digital has announced enhancements to VAX 8000 computers, price reductions of 17% to 20% on MicroVAX 2000 computers, and price-performance adjustments across its entire product line. The changes include:

- Increased throughput of up to 40% on VAX 8000 computers through the use of new high-density memory products.
- The ability of all VAX 8000 systems to directly attach to Local Area VAXclusters, eliminating the need for a UNIBUS channel.
- A 50% reduction in the footprint size of VAX 8350 and 8550 VAXcluster systems, resulting in unusually high power in a very small space.
- Up to four Ethernet connections for Local Area VAXclusters or DECnet Local Area Networks on any VAX 8000 series system. ■

During the past three years, Digital has donated nearly \$10 million to MMC. Says Bob Palmer, vice president, Semiconductor Operations, "Digital's investments in education and research are part of a long-term, ongoing commitment to support computing in academic communities. This latest grant is aimed at increasing MMC's ability to provide more students with hands-on experience in microelectronics."

MMC is the focal point of activity for the 10 area universities involved in the program. Those universities are the University of Massachusetts—Amherst, MIT, University of Lowell, Merrimack College, Northeastern University, Southeastern Massachusetts University, Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Boston University, Tufts University and Harvard.

MMC is part of a research consortium created by state legislation sponsored by U.S. Rep. Chester Atkins and supported by Gov. Michael Dukakis. The project is aimed at bringing together state government, industries, and universities to provide advanced training and research opportunities in microelectronics and semiconductor technologies. ■

Text-based course on VAX SCAN language for programmers

First employee graduates from National Technological University

National Merit Scholarship Test dates scheduled

The National Merit Scholarship Corp. (NMSC) has set two test dates for the PSAT/NMSQT (the qualifying test administered by National Merit). The dates are Saturday, Oct. 17, or Tuesday, Oct. 20.

Dependents of full-time Digital employees are eligible to compete in the Digital/National Merit Scholarship Program, provided they take the PSAT/NMSQT in the fall of their junior year of high school. NMSC reviews all PSAT/NMSQTs taken by high school juniors, determines semifinalists and forwards application packages to them in the fall of their senior year. Digital dependents are identified by National Merit through the application package. No other entry form is needed.

Every semifinalist must fulfill additional requirements specified by NMSC and advance

to finalist standing in order to be considered for a scholarship. Scholarship winners are selected by National Merit on a competitive basis without regard to family financial circumstances.

The stipend of each Digital Merit Scholarship is determined individually by NMSC. It can range from the minimum of \$500 to the maximum of \$2,000 per year for up to four years of undergraduate study.

All phases of the competition, including the selection of winners and payment of Merit Scholarship stipends, are handled for Digital by NMSC.
