Benefit survey results are in

A representative sample of the total Digital U.S. population, 4,000 employees, received questionnaires last July on the company's benefits programs. About 48 percent responded to the opportunity to comment on Digital's health care programs and other benefits and on benefit costs and communications.

"We learned a lot from the survey," said Ed Brady, U.S. Benefits manager. "Employee opinions will influence our future plan design and communication materials."

The majority of employees (61 percent) evaluated the information they received from Digital on their benefits program as "clear, concise and useful." Eighteen percent say they receive "too little" information and 14 percent say it is "confusing."

Using survey responses, Corporate Benefits is currently reviewing its communication materials and benefit plans. More emphasis will be placed on clear explanations and frequent updates of the benefits booklet in the U.S. Employee Benefits package.

"Services among different Health Maintenance Organizations (HMO) and between the Digital Medical Plan and HMOs vary widely," said John Rosala, Corporate manager of Health Care Planning. "In future benefit communication, we intend to provide detailed comparisons of services and costs so that employees can weigh the pros and cons and make a more informed choice."

For health care, the company currently offers a choice between the Digital Medical Plan and an HMO. The survey pointed out that employees make their choice of a

plan primarily on the basis of convenience.

"We intend to provide more education on health care issues," John continued, "particularly on the subject of cost containment. Almost half of our employees feel that the government is primarily responsible for keeping health care costs down. The fact is that we each have a role. Features in our plan like out-patient surgery, pre-admission testing and second surgical opinions will not only help to contain costs, but, more importantly, will enhance the quality of care delivered to employees and their dependents."

Employees in HMOs indicated that their highest out-of-pocket expenses went for prescription drugs and dental care, since many HMOs do not offer this coverage. Participants in the Digital Medical Program spent the most money on medical care. The majority of employees in both plans feel their overall health care expenses are reasonable.

Employees also showed an interest in learning more about retirement benefits. The company is addressing this need already by conducting formal pre-retirement planning seminar for employees

LDP demos lab microcomputers and minicomputer systems

A display of four computer systems designed for scientific research will highlight Digital's participation in the 32nd Pittsburgh Conference.

To be held on the week of March 9 in Atlantic City, N.J., the conference is for laboratory researchers. Digital's Laboratory Data Products (LDP) Group will demonstrate the company's laboratory systems. The LDP product line is headquartered in

Marlboro and its manufacturing operations are in Westminister.

Featured at the Digital booth will be a PDP-11/44 minicomputer system and three microcomputer systems, the MINC/DECLAB 23, MINC 23 and MINC-11 systems. MINC (Modular Instrument Computer) systems are designed to enable a researcher to create a computer system to meet application needs using simple plug-in modules.

Several seminars, including films and lectures, are scheduled for the remainder of March:

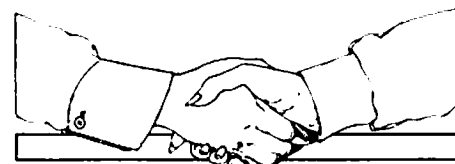

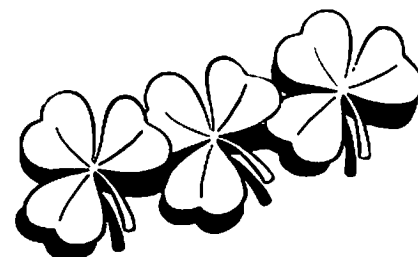
EMPLOYEE KUDOS

How to become a certified life saver:

The Health Services Department is offering courses in Standard First Aid and Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) to employees who work at the Mill in Maynard.

Nurses from Health Services are certified instructors in First Aid and CPR and have planned this program to teach employees about emergency treatment of the sick and injured.

The American Red Cross Multimedia First Aid Course is held on two consecutive days, four hours each day. Subjects covered are artificial respiration, rescuing the choking victim, bandaging and splinting. The course also reviews the treatment of chemical fire and radiation burns and poisoning. The Certification in First Aid, employees will receive upon completion, remains valid for three years.

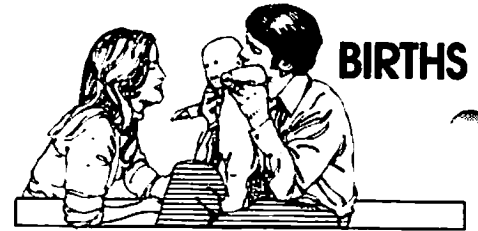
The American Heart Associa-

tion Heart Saver Course is four hours long and can be completed in one morning. The class includes identifying the signs of a heart attack, response to sudden death and performing CPR. Your certification in CPR is valid for one year. Refresher courses will be offered at the Mill.

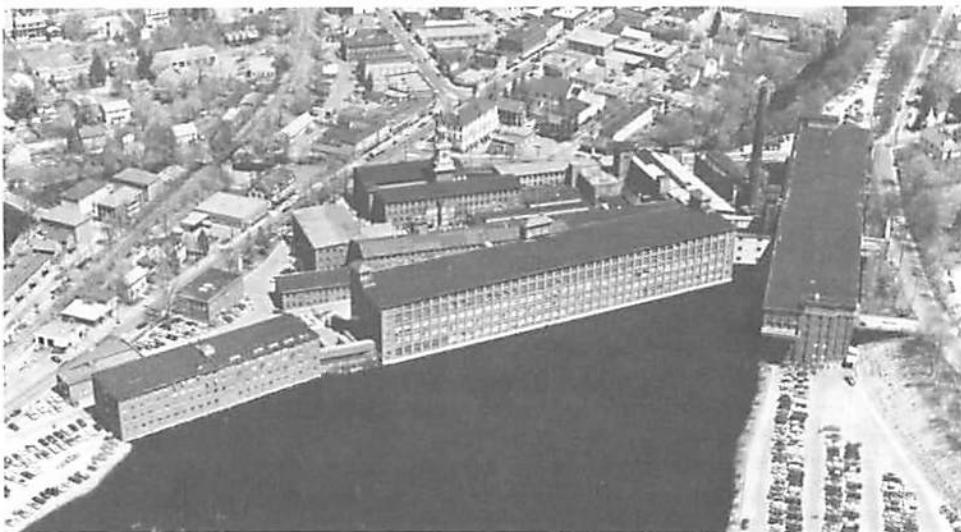
The Boston Shakespeare Company has reserved April 3 for a special performance of "The Tempest" for Digital employees.

Fire Hazards-Life safety is studied by Risk Management



In the test with a free burning fire, ash, smoke, 30-foot flames and temperatures of 1600 degrees impressed Digital representatives with the dangers of plastic materials. Facilities in Ayr, Scotland; Merrimack and Contoocook, N.H.; Northboro, Marlboro and Maynard, Mass. were among those represented.



In the test for combustibility, 15 foot high stacks of (defective) RL01 and RL02 disk packs were completely engulfed in flames in less than five minutes.



After being brought under control by the Test Center sprinkler system, the charred remains were examined to determine the actual amount consumed in the fire.
