Digital to install private television network

Corporate Telecommunications and Educational Services have designed a broadcast video network which will provide training to some 22 locations in the United States and Canada beginning this fall.

The Digital Video Network (DVN) is a satellite based, private television network which will operate in the one-way video, two-way audio mode. Programming will originate in the existing Media Production Services facilities at the Bedford location. Digital employees located at any of the 22 network locations will be able to interact with the presenter(s) by calling the Bedford network host facility with questions.

Several applications for network use have been developed. The DVN will broadcast programs on topics such as management, technical, and sales training, marketing information, field service training, sales updates and new product announcements. In addition to its internal uses, the Digital Video Network will provide revenue to the corporation by providing customer training on a pay-per-view basis. All programming signals are encrypted to insure privacy. Digital's

Media Services Group will assist organizations in the production of their programs.

Through the implementation of a private television network, Digital will join other Fortune 100 companies, such as Ford Motor Corporation, who have discovered the benefits of this communications medium.

By using the network, organizations will be able to communicate critical, timely information to geographically dispersed organizations in a cost effective manner. Since employees viewing the broadcast will have immediate access to the program originator via the return audio capability, there is little room for misinterpretation and ample opportunity for active participation and communication.

Indiana University and Digital launch \$15M computer network

Indiana University (IU) in Bloomington, Indiana, and Digital have signed an agreement to create a computing network that will link the University's eight campuses. The network will provide new and enhance existing computing resources statewide for 80,000 students, faculty and administrators.

The announcement was made by Daniel W. DeHayes, dean for Academic Computing and director of Bloomington Academic Computing Services, Indiana University, and Bob Trocchi, Group manager, Education Computer Systems, at a ceremony on the University's Bloomington campus.

The agreement will enable the IU to acquire computing and networking resources from the entire Digital product line, with a potential value of \$15-million. In exchange, IU will provide Digital with expertise in using computers for education and research in a networked environment. The University will act as a demonstration site for Digital products. In addition, the agreement will enable IU and Digital to explore new applications for computers in the humanities and in the liberal arts.

Phased in over the next four years, the network will include Digital's VAX 8600 computer system, IVIS (Interactive Video Information System), MicroVAX systems, terminals, and networking resources. According to Dean DeHayes, "This program supports the teaching, research, and service missions of Indiana University by providing students and faculty with exposure to the newest information technology. As a result of this agreement with Digital, IU and its graduates will be better prepared to meet the new technological challenges of the workplace now and in the future. It will also provide an opportunity for IU to increase its ability to serve the emerging technological needs of the state of Indiana."

Ultimately, the agreement will enhance networking resources available to the University's campuses in Bloomington, Indianapolis, Fort Wayne, Gary, South Bend, New Albany, Kokomo, and Richmond.

"Through the Campuswide Program, the University's pioneering efforts will help Digital to meet the growing need for networking resources in the education marketplace."

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Financial Development Program graduates its first class

CAEM signs marketing agreement with CAE Systems, Inc.

CAEM (Computer Aided Engineering and Manufacturing) recently signed an agreement with CAE Systems, Inc. (a wholly owned subsidiary of Tektronix, Inc.) to cooperatively market its CAE 2000 schematics capture and design data base software on Digital's VAX family of computers, including the VAXstation II.

CAE Systems is one of the leading software vendors in the electronics engineering marketplace and is one of the first vendors to make its software available on the VAXstation II workstation.

The CAE 2000 schematics capture and design data base software can be used for both integrated circuit and printed circuit board design. The product includes a hierarchical, multi-window, schematics editor with advanced workstation features like pop-up windows, extensive mouse use and user-programmable command structures. The schematics editor is best suited for operation on the VAXstation II.

Interfaces to popular simulation analysis and verification programs such as SPICE[®], are also available. These interfaces allow the designer to use the larger VAX systems for extensive simulation and verification.

Features of CAE 2000 are a roving probe and designers calculator that shorten the time it takes to design working circuits.

The CAE 2000 software coupled with the full range of VAX computers - from the VAXstation II and 520 workstations to the VAX 8600 supermini provides customers with complete solutions for electronic engineering applications.

CAE 2000 software operates on the full range of compatible VAX computers, allowing a user to put some parts of an integrated design onto a VAXstation II or 520 workstation and other parts on a VAX supermini without being concerned about different operating systems. This allows users to make effective use of large VAXs for extensive simulation, analysis, and verification tasks and large database storage requirements.

Digital's network architecture provides a common communications link, not just between its workstation products, but between the VAXstation workstations and the VAX superminicomputers. The designer can move easily from task to task, from VAXstations to the largest VAX computers and VAX-clusters linked by the DECnet network, without the need to change from the VMS operating system.

CAE 2000 software integrates all phases of a design around a central database. Digital's VAX/VMS family of computers and its DECnet network integrate all levels of computing power.

Digital sues EMC Corp. for patent infringements

Digital has filed suit in U.S. District Court for the District of Massachusetts against EMC Corporation of Natick, Mass., seeking an injunction against further manufacturing, marketing, selling, and distribution of EMC's VAX-11/780- and VAX-11/785-compatible memory controllers, SBI interface boards, and memory boards.

Digital charges that the EMC products infringe patents that Digital holds for SBI and memory boards used in its VAX-11/780 and VAX-11/785 computer systems.

The suit specifically seeks a permanent injunction against EMC Corporation to bar further manufacturing, marketing, distribution, and selling of its VAX-11/780- and VAX-

11/785-compatible memory controllers and boards and also seeks treble damages based on Digital's lost profits from EMC's willful patent infringements.

The VAX-11/780 computer has become a *de facto* standard of performance comparison for the computer industry.

This action taken by Digital demonstrates the company's long-standing policy and commitment to protect vigorously its innovations resulting from investments in research and development. Digital will continue to pursue aggressively patent infringement activity on a worldwide basis, as it has in suits involving Digital's MASSBUS products, RL disks, and SBI interconnects. ■
