# Two product groups merge

# Digital enhances 'MINC' laboratory computer systems

MINC (for Modular Instrument Computer) systems are designed to enable scientists and engineers to configure an integrated system from modular computer elements. The new enhancements, which inmlude a new graphics terminal, a igh-speed floating-point processor, and new interfacing modules, extend the functional capabilities of the MINC-11. MINC-23, and MINC/DECLAB23 systems.

MINC systems are used widely in laboratory research environments. University and government markets include chemical and physical research. Industrial research markets include chemicals, pharmaceuticals, automotive research, petrochemicals, aeronautics, and electronics. Hardware and software enhancements are designed to provide greater versatility for computer systems used in these disciplines.

The MINC system enhancements are also available as options for field upgrade of existing MINC systems.

## Digital introduces VT125 video terminal

Digital recently announced its newest video terminal with data plotting and business graphics capabilities. Called the VT125, the new terminal is an extension of Digital's VT100 and VT105 video terminals. The VT125 is designed for business, laboratory and scientific graphics applications. The terminal can display pictures and shapes, plotted trend lines, bar charts, pie charts, point-plot graphs and continuous data plots.

Typical business applications of the VT125 terminal include generation of sales progress charts, financial distribution bar graphs and resource-division diagrams. Scientific and laboratory applications include presentation of data histograms and presentation and comparison of spectra.

The VT125 terminal incorporates a microprocessor that enables it to execute locally Digital's Remote Graphic Instruction Set (ReGIS). With ReGIS, pictorial data can be created and stored as simple ASCII text. ReGIS commands can be inserted in programs written in any programming language including BASIC, COBOL, FORTRAN or DIBOL.

Concurrent with the announcement if the VT125, Digital released the availability of kits to upgrade a VT100 or VT105 terminal to a VT125 terminal. The new terminal will be manufactured in Albuquerque, the kits will be made in Westfield, Mass. Deliveries are scheduled for fall.

## UMass makes videotape program available to employees

The Videotape Instructional Program, offered through the Office of Extended Engineering Education of the University of Massachusett's School of Engineering, offers employees the opportunity to acquire state-of-the-art education and training in a variety of engineering disciplines. ## Identifying heat-related illness

Prolonged exposure to an extremely hot, humid environment may cause serious heat illnesses. It is estimated that in hot and humid conditions up to two quarts of fluids can be lost in an hour through perspiration. If this fluid is not replaced, varying degrees of dehydration will result.

The best way to prevent serious fluid loss and heat disorder is to avoid excess activity and exposure during peak mid-day temperatures, to drink plenty of fluids and to sensibly increase the intake of salty foods. (If a medical condition requires limited salt intake, check with your physician before modifying your diet.)

There are three types of heatrelated illnesses:

Heat cramps are painful muscle spasms, usually in the legs or abdomen, after a period of strenuous activity. They are caused by the loss of salt from the body through sweating or the inadequate intake of salt. The cramps can last up to 15 minutes, but will usually disappear spontaneously. Gentle stretching of the leg muscles by pulling the toes up can relieve the pain of leg cramps. Salty liquids (one teaspoon of salt to a quart of liquid) can also be given in sips to restore the body's sodium

Heat exhaustion is caused by inadequate body temperature regulation and excess salt and/or

water loss due to sweating. Symptoms include headache, dizziness weakness, irritability, nausea and vomiting. To treat heat exhaustion, give the victim sips of salt water, have him/her lie down and raise feet eight to twelve inches, apply cool, wet cloths and fan or remove victim to an airconditioned room.

If the victim vomits do not give any more fluids, but take him/her to the hospital. Intravenous salt may be necessary.

Heat stroke is the least common, but most serious of heat disorders. It is the result of a disturbance of the sweating and heat loss mechanism. Heat stroke occurs most commonly in the very young and the elderly.

The onset of heat stroke is rapid. Initially, the person experiences headache, nausea and weakness. Later, signs of confusion, lack of coordination and lapses into unconsciousness may occur. The skin is characteristically hot, red and dry due to the absence of sweating. The body temperature may be 10 degrees or higher. The pulse is rapid and strong.

Persons found in a state of collapse and not sweating during hot weather should be brought immediately to an emergency room for treatment. Cold packs or repeated sponging with cool water or alcohol should be applied en route to the hospital.
