

## Deadlines for DTW

## DTW's discount policy

Digital Equipment Corporation has a non-solicitation policy and does not want private businesses or individuals seeking profit from its employees. As a result, *Digital This Week* will no longer print discounts.

Employee Activities will assume full responsibility for disseminating discount information. A bulletin board display will be maintained to make discounts available to interested employees.

DTW will continue to announce all programs sponsored, planned and instituted by Digital through Employee Activities.

## Fica Tax increases in 1981

The Fica Wage Rate for 1981 will increase from 6.13 percent to 6.65 percent, and the wage base will increase from \$25,900 to \$29,700 on January 1. The rate increase will affect all employees, while the base increase will affect only employees earning more than \$25,900. The new rate will be reflected in your Jan. 8 paycheck.

## PK helipad has moved

The new helipad at Parker Street is now in use. Helicopters will be landing at the pad built on the rise behind the PK3 parking lot. Employees waiting for flights must still use the special van for shelter until the building on the site is completed. Be sure to check in with helipad attendants at least five minutes before your flight.

## Calling Colorado

Colorado now has Direct Inward Dial. Callers will be able to dial Colorado facilities direct, without assistance, from outside the Digital Telephone Network. To accommodate the direct dial system, all DTN extensions will change as of Dec. 22. The plant's new main DTN number will be 8-522-2000, from outside the DTN dial 8-303-594-2000. You can expect this line to be tied up with inquiries for new extensions.

## Postal rates on the rise

Effective Jan. 1, international postal rates will be increased. Airmail letters will be 40 cents an ounce, up 9 cents. Airmail printed matter postage will increase by 60 percent. During or after February, there will be a 33 percent hike in domestic rates.

The cost of mailing domestic letters, now at 15 cents an ounce, will be 20 cents.

Marlboro's P.E.O. gave a tour of the facility with special emphasis on entrances and exits, possible trouble spots, their emergency procedures, elevator locations and the general layout of the building and grounds. Marlboro P.E.O. could be responsible for the evacuation of over 2100 employees in an emergency.
