























Tigers, Patriots In Bombastic Battle

In a jammed packed action thrill drama that defied the vivid imagination of any fiction writer, Maynard and Concord-Carlisle battled to a dazzling 30-30 stalemate in what must be termed as the greatest wide open grid game of any schoolboys in the area. This was the Tigers debut on this Regional gridiron and they helped to lay the cornerstone for future historical records, Saturday afternoon.

This free-scoring blitz started with the opening whistle, gained momentum as it continued down to the final gun that left some 3500 loyal fanatics gasping and limp at the end.

In the first half there were six touchdowns, three by each eleven, and each squad had to fight back to gain two point conversions to be assured of the tie.

Maynard gained an early lead, gave away to the hometown Concord-Carlisle, fought back for a 22-8 advantage only to have the Patriots come storming back to finish up at a 22-all deadlock at half time.

Concord-Carlisle gained the tie in the early minutes of the last quanter. Bob Sebastyn, Maynard's fine quarterback, put on a brilliant exhibition with his passing and running as he brought the inspired Tigers to life.

On the C-C side Co-captain Scott Watson duplicated the feat with his running and pass catching that resulted in a total of 20 of his team's points.

Maynard took the opening kick-off drove 71 yards with Sebastyn on the keeper play outrunning the C-C defense for the first t.d. The attempt to rush was stopped and the Tigers led 6-0. But not for long. After taking the kick-off, Watson on the third play from scrimmage broke thru the Tiger line was out in the open and sped 56 yards to knot the count. Ther Johnny Hopkins hit Jim Rust for the pass conversion and C-C led 8-6.

In the final minutes Watson eluded tacklers on a 44 yard run, but it was nullified because of a penalty. Too much credit cannot be given both teams, both coaching staffs for this battle that kept the fans on edge.

Walt Moore, George Murphy, Dennis Salmi all played rugged defensive football for the Tigers. Watson, Kelley, Childs and Hopkins all lived up to their reputations as fine ball players. It was a game that will live for all who were on hand for the historical event.

It was the second week in succession (that a hard-fighting Maynard eleven was forced to settle for a tie, thus, there is just no luck anyhow.

But the Tigers were full or life, as they drove 74 yards in the last minutes of the first period. Bob Sebastyn hit Bob Brooks on a 30 yard pass play and bombs to Jim Marcey and Joe Mancini brought the ball to the CC five yard stripe. Here Sebastyn hit Mancini for the t.d. and the same aerial combination added the conversion as the Tigers led 14-8.



Justice prevailed on a bright, sunny, and seasonably warm Saturday last, when Maynard's battling Tiger's and Concord's quick-striking Patriots played to a 30-30 tie before a large crowd.

In a wide open ball game, Maynard quarterback Bob Sebassyn threw for 276 yards and two touchdowns and ran for 45 yards and another score.

His Patriot counterpart Johnny Hopkins threw for 158 yards and was aided by a devastating ground attack in the form of Twin Tornadoes Scott Watson and Billy Kelley. Between them they rushed for 196 yards and caught six passes for another 155 vards.

Watson kicked up the biggest storm this week, scoring three bouchdowns, one on a spectacular broken field run of 76 yards with a screen pass, another on a 52 yard run from scrimmage, and a third with a ten yard pass from Hopkins.

Concord's fourth score came on a 40 yard run by defensive end Tony Zographos after he caught a Sebastyn fumble in mid-air.

Four players scored the Maynard touchdowns - Sebastyn on a 13 yard run around end, and backs Joe Mancini on a five yard Sebastyn pass, Bob Brooks on a two yard plunge, and Mike Graceffa on a 64 yard pass from Sebastyn for the only Maynard score of the second half.

The justice lay in the score being a true reflection of the game. Each team lost two rumbles, had one pass intercepted, gained yardage at will and was totally ineffective on defense. Concord led in first downs, 17-16; Maynard outgained the Patriots in total yardage, 347-334.

44 POINTS IN HALF

Concord relied more on its ground attack, but was effective through the air. Maynard, offensively, did the reverse.

The second half was anti-climatic to the 44 points, 22 for each team, and the constant excitement that was packed into the first 24 minutes of play. Prior to the intermission there were no punts nor lossees of the ball on downs.

Maynard's third period score on the 64 yard pass to Graceffa came on the first play after a Kelley fumble stalled a Patriot drive on the Maynard 36. Kelley had gained 18 yards on a slant off tackle when he was hit and George Murphy recovered the fumble for Maynard.

No sooner mad Graceffa caught a Sebastyn pass for the conversion pass, then Maynard kicked off and on the first play from scrimmage Hopkins and Watson uncorked the 76 yards screen pass. Gary Bergin threw a key block to get Watson started. Scotty zigged and zagged to midfield, then picked up nice blocks from Zographos and Kelley and raced for the score. A Hopkins pass slipped through Hollenkamp's outstretched arms and the score was 22-14.

Concord then kicked off to Maynard and on Maynard's first play from its own 40 yard line the Patriots' Hollenkamp and Zographos combined on the most unusual, most startling play of the game.

Hollenkamp raced in from defensive end to nab Bob Sebastyn one of the few times all day the Maynard quarterback was caught behind scrimmage.

As Hollenkamp hit Sebastyn the ball popped into the air. Zographos, charging from his end position, grabbed the ball in mid air and never broke stride as he headed for the end zone 40 yards away and the first touchdown of his career.

Hopkins was caught behind scrimmage on the extra point attempt, but an offside against Maynard moved the ball half the distance to the goal line and Watson took it in to tie the

Maynard struck first in the game taking the opening kickoff and driving 65 yards in eight plays. Sebastyn scored the touchdown with two 13 yard runs after a first down at the Concord 26. Sebastyn fumbled the snap and the extra point was missed.

Concord took an 8-6 lead two minutes later. Kelley ran 13 yards with a pitchout, Hopkins was thrown for a four yard loss, and Watson shot off right tackle for 52 yards and a touchdown. Jimmy Rust caught a Hopkins pass for two extra points and Concord had its only lead of the game. It didn't last long.

A 31 yard Sebastyn to Brooks pass contributed to a 74 yard drive which ended with a Sebastyn to Mancini pass for five yards and the score. Maynard made it 14-8 on the identica. play that had just scored a touchdown as Mancini was once again clear on the left side of the end zone.

Graceffa was behind the Concord safetyman when he caught the pass on the next play, and the rest was easy. The score was set up by the inability of the Patriot ends to contain Sebastyn. As the safety men inched-in anticipating a run, Sebastyn spotted Graceffa and there was the go-ahead score.

Sebastyn hit Brooks in the end zone for the two-point conversion and Maynard was finished scoring for the day.

Kelley carried on four of these plays for 33 yards including a key 13 yard gain on a fourth and four play at the Maynard 29 yard line.

Following this first down, Kelley ran for six yards before Hopkins hit Watson with the ten yard scoring pass on the right

TOUCHDOWN NULLIFIED

The extra points play which gained Concord a tie was on a bit of razzle-dazzle. Watson took a pitchout to the left on an option play. He was immediately caught by two Tiger tacklers, but managed to throw the ball to Jimmy Rust, alone in the end

Concord did score once more on a wobbly 57 yard touchdown pass from Hopkins to Watson along the left sideline, but an offsides penalty nullified this touchdown and Concord couldn't get started again.

The teams then traded the game's only interceptions and the tie was assured on the last play of the game after Maynard had reached the Patriot's 21 yard line. Sebastyn faded to pass with six seconds remaining, was chased by Greg Hollenkamp and Dan Taft, and was finally caught for a nineteen yard loss by Hollenkamp.

Maynard's first half touchdowns came on drives of 65 yards on eight plays, 74 yards on 10 plays, and 96 yards on nine plays. The latter score came minutes after Concord fumbled a handoff in the backfield on a first down play from the Maynard three yard line. This third Maynard score gave the Tigers a 22-8 lead that was as shortlived as is conceivable

Concord immediately moved the ball to the Tiger three. Watson carried four times for 41 yards, his 27 yard jaunt putting the ball at the three yard line.

But following the costly fumble on a Hopkins to Watson handoff, Sebastyn hit Brooks with a pass at the Maynard 30. Brooks was apparently halted there, but he broke away from Kelley and Rick Oleson and reached the Concord 33 before Kelley caught up with him again. The play covered 63 yards. Six plays later Brooks carried two yards for the score.

It was now 22-8 and the Patriots' fireworks followed. Concord almost made it three touchdowns in a row. After Zographos scored on the fumble recovery, the Patriots tried an onsides kick and Leo Duggan recovered the ball for Concord at the Maynard 47

The Patriots reached the Maynard seven on two passes to Kelley, but the half ended as Watson carried to the four.

The real justice of the outcome of this traditional game can be summed up in one sentence: Both teams played too well to lose; but neither deserved to win.
















