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In memoriam: General Georges F. Doriot

General Georges Doriot, who in 1957 as head of American Research and Development Corp. provided the investment capital to start Digital, died on June 2 at the age of 87. He had served as a member of Digital's Board of Directors since 1972.

"His goal was to nurture, encourage and help businesses," observes Ken Olsen, president. "This is quite contrary to most risk capital organizations. The General was patient with companies when they were not doing well, and when they were doing well, not selling short to turn a quick profit.

"His influence on Digital was quiet, cautious, often indirect, but very effective. He defined 'excellence' as 'a degree of gratefulness, a compliment to somebody who is hard up and needs help, another minute given to your work, another idea applied to your product, a help to your superior. Excellence is that tiny quantity which can do so much."

"To the General, excellence included sensitivity and graciousness to others. In the workplace it included a sense of responsibility to the entire organization.

"His thinking and Digital's history and values are intertwined." General Doriot grew up in France and came to the United States in 1921 to attend the Harvard Business School. There he became assistant dean, associate professor and eventually professor of industrial management. In World War II he rose to the rank of brigadier general in the U.S. Army, serving as director of military planning for the Quartermaster Corps and deputy director of research and development for the War Department general staff. After the war, he returned to teaching and also became head of American Research and Development Corp., a venture capital firm that helped start some 150 companies, including Digital.

For 35 years, up until his retirement in 1966, General Doriot taught a course titled "Manufacturing," that was intended to

imbue students with his ideals of how a business person should behave. Almost 7,000 students took his course. "The top and middle ranks of U.S. industrial leadership today include many whom Doriot helped get what he calls a 'running start,'" noted "Fortune" magazine in March 1979. ■

Digital, Cray form marketing/product development pact

Digital and Cray Research, Inc., the leading producer of supercomputers, have announced an agreement to cooperatively market and develop computer products that link their respective computer environments.

At the same time, the companies announced the VAX Supercomputer Gateway, a product that increases multi-stream movement of data between VAX and Cray systems by up to five times faster than existing connections. The high data throughput of the gateway is designed to help engineers and scientists to be more productive and to help shorten the product development cycle.

The agreement targets customers who need both supercomputing and interactive computing capabilities. These customers include scientists and engineers involved in

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molecular modeling, finite element analysis, computational fluid dynamics, complex seismic and geological modeling, and Very Large Scale Integration (VLSI) circuit design. The products are also used in commercial applications such as econometric and financial modeling.

In addition, both Digital and Cray will participate in cooperative sales calls, technical demonstrations, and sales support activities involving their respective hardware and software products. Digital will sell the VAX Supercomputer Gateway, VAX/VMS software, and related network products; Cray Research will sell the Cray Station software, supercomputer and related products. Each company will service its respective systems.

Said Bob Glorioso, vice president, High-Performance Systems, "It is our intention through this agreement to help provide our customers integrated product solutions that will give them a superior performance, a competitive advantage and the best return on investment. In addition, we will expand supercomputing into new application areas. Our alliance with Cray reinforces our commitment to provide our customers a complete range of computing solutions from the desktop to the supercomputer via a single operating system—VMS."

Gary Eichhorn, manager of Laboratory Data Products, added, "This supports our continued commitment to provide computerintegrated research solutions to researchers worldwide."

The companies said a major facet of the agreement is the "Distributed Supercomputing Environment Program" through which they will seek to develop new applications for their respective computing environments. Targeted markets include research, electronics, energy exploration, government, automotive, aerospace, education, petrochemical, pharmaceutical, finance, and entertainment.

John Rollwagen, Cray president and chief

executive officer, said, "Cray is continually working to enhance and extend its supercomputing environment. Many of our customers utilize Digital's VAX systems, VAX-stations, and DECnet communications in conjunction with our interactive access software and supercomputers. So it makes good business sense that both companies work closely to provide the most efficient, cost-effective solutions for our customers."

Cray Research, Inc., headquartered in Minneapolis, is the world's leading supplier of supercomputing systems.

Digital awarded \$80 million computer contract for U.S. Census

Digital has won an \$80 million contract to supply VAX computer systems to the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce, for use in the 1990 Decennial Census. The computer systems also will support the 1987 Economic and Agricultural Census, statistical analysis, and develop a geographic data base to support Census Bureau activities.

Under terms of the six-year contract, Digital will provide VAX 8000 series and MicroVAX II computer systems; training, field service and software, including data bases, languages and applications software. When installation is complete, the Census Bureau will have VAX 8000 computer systems in its headquarters in Suitland, Md., and in its field offices. An additional 450 MicroVAX IIs in district offices across the country will support the 1990 Census.

Harvey Weiss, vice president, U.S. Operations and Government Systems, said Digital won the contract by providing a proven VAX computer hardware and software solution. "This award represents a major victory for Digital and lends credence to our long-term strategy of one architecture for all environments," he said.

Digital awarded \$114 million Air Force contract

Digital has been awarded a five-year contract with a potential value of \$114 million to supply the U.S. Air Force with computer systems for continued research and development of air defense systems.

This is Digital's second major government contract in a month. The company was awarded an \$80 million contract to supply VAX computer systems to the Bureau of the Census, U.S. Department of Commerce. (See story on page 2.)

Under terms of the Scientific and Engineering Worksystems (SEWS) program award, Digital will supply the Air Force with VAX 8650, MicroVAX II and MicroVAX II/-GPX computer systems, field service, soft-

ware service and training. The worksystems will generate three-dimensional graphics used in the research, design and simulation of sophisticated air defense systems, and will be deployed at U.S. Air Force installations throughout the world. Computer system shipments will begin within 90 days.

Harvey Weiss, vice president for U.S. Operations and Government Systems, said Digital provided the Air Force with a strong technical match of off-the-shelf hardware and software. "The "familiness" of the VAX architecture, Digital's networking leadership and our expertise in the engineering worksystems marketplace provided us with an award winning solution," he said.

Administrative forum held in Shrewsbury




