Digital and Sony announce technical cooperation agreement

Digital and Sony Corporation of America have signed a technical cooperation agreement to allow for exchange of product and certain technical documentation on videotex related products. The project will examine the compatibility of Sony's Videotex Frame Creator System and Digital's VAX VTX videotex software.

Digital's VAX VTX is a distributed videotex

system which gives users easy access to information. In addition to distributing information in the most common form of computer output, ASCII (the American Standard Code for Information Exchange), VAX VTX also supports the major international text and graphic videotex protocols including NAPLPS (North American Presentation Level Protocol Syntax), J-NAPLPS (Japa-

nese NAPLPS), Prestel (the British graphics protocol videotex standard) and CEPT (a European videotex standard).

Sony's Videotex Frame Creator System 100 converts video images into NAPLPS pages. This process is significantly more efficient, in high volume applications, than the traditional means of "drawing" videotex pages one-at-a-time on a computer-based creation system. The Sony system also makes it practical to have a greater variety of NAPLPS images in a videotex infobase.

"Digital is the leader in supplying videotex systems for both corporate and business-to-business applications," said Murray Copp, Digital's Videotex Marketing manager. "It is exciting for Digital to have this agreement with Sony, a leader in video imaging. This project will lead to allowing users to create NAPLPS pages for Digital's videotex offerings more easily, quickly and cost effectively." ■

First National Bank of Chicago buys \$1-million banking system from Digital

Digital has announced the sale of a \$1-million computer system to The First National Bank of Chicago.

The new computer system will be used to implement an application program that will upgrade the bank's current system for letter of credit transactions, collections and acceptances.

Under terms of the agreement, Digital will provide First National with a VAXcluster configuration of two VAX-11/785 systems,

DECnet/Ethernet communications, and software and services including DATA-TRIEVE, a comprehensive data management tool.

The First National Bank of Chicago is the principal subsidiary of First Chicago Corporation, the 10th largest banking holding company in the U.S., with assets of more than \$40 billion. First Chicago employs 13,000 people in 35 countries around the world. ■

Digital's guaranteed student/parental loans explained

Digital's Guaranteed Student Loan Program and Parent Loan Program are offered to employees, their spouses and dependent children to assist them in financing post-secondary education. United Student Aid (USA) Funds, a private not-for-profit guarantee agency, administers the program through participating lenders. The loans are fully guaranteed by USA Funds on the basis of reserve supplied by Digital.

Applications are provided through local Personnel departments. Credit checks or cosigners are not required. To help employees better understand the program, Ronnie Lorenzen of Corporate Employee Services and Recreation, answers some commonly asked questions about how the program is administered.

Q What are Corporate Sponsored Guaranteed Student/Parent Loan Programs?

A They are programs established to help employees and their families who need to borrow to meet the costs of postsecondary education. Through a contractual agreement with the United Student Aid Funds, Digital guarantees repayment of any educational loan made by a Digital employee, his/her spouse or dependent child. Banks are identified, applications are provided, no credit checks are required and no cosigner is required.

1) *Guaranteed Student Loan Program* - usually made available to children of the employees but may also include spouses and/or the employees directly.

2) *Guaranteed Parent Loan Program* - usually made available to the employees who are the parents of dependent undergraduates.

Q Who is eligible for the Guaranteed Student/Parent Loan Program?

A Employees with two years seniority with the company are eligible for the program for their dependent children, spouse, and for themselves if they have received a pre-approved leave of absence for educational purposes. In addition, retirees with a minimum of five years of service with the com-

pany at the time of their retirement are eligible for the program for their dependent children, spouses and for themselves. Dependent children and widows/widowers of deceased employees who would have met the two year eligibility requirements had they lived are also eligible.

Q Are there eligibility standards established for the student?

A Yes, students must be U.S. citizens or nationals and permanent residents of the United States. They must be enrolled at an eligible school as determined by the U.S. Department of Education. They must be enrolled in good standing as at least a half-time student as determined by the school.

Q How much may be borrowed?

A 1) *Guaranteed Student Loan Program* -

* *UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS* may borrow up to \$2,500 per academic year up to a maximum of \$12,500 for all undergraduate study.

* *GRADUATE STUDENTS* may borrow up to \$5,000 per academic year up to a maximum of \$25,000 for undergraduate and graduate studies combined.

2) *Guaranteed Parent Loan Program* -

* *PARENTS* may borrow up to \$3,000 per academic year on behalf of each dependent undergraduate student up to a maximum of \$15,000 for each student.

Under both the Student and Parent Loan Programs, no loan may be greater than the difference between the student's cost of education and all other financial aid available, including student loans, as determined by the school.

Q What are the finance charges and interest rates I will pay?

A 1) *Guaranteed Student Loan Program* -

* The finance charges consist of a government-required 5% origination fee which is deducted from the loan proceeds by the lender at the time the loan is disbursed. This fee is passed on to the federal government to help defray the cost of subsidizing these low-interest loans.

* The interest rate is 8 percent.

* Interest begins to accrue from the date the loan is disbursed and continues until the loan is completely repaid.

2) *Guaranteed Parent Loan Program* -

* There is no origination fee.

* the interest rate is 12 percent

* Interest begins to accrue from the date the loan is disbursed and continues until the loan is completely repaid.

Q Because I have been with the company for two years, is my dependent child automatically eligible to borrow money under Digital's Guaranteed Student Loan Program?

A There is no guarantee that your child will be eligible to borrow money. In July of 1982,

Congress passed legislation requiring a Needs Test to be given to all students applying for loans. Under this Needs Test, a family's gross adjusted earnings for the previous year are taken into consideration. Families with a gross adjusted income of \$30,000 or less are automatically eligible for loans. That is not to say, however, that families who earn in excess of \$30,000 per year are not eligible. The Federal Register is used to determine family size and family obligation as it pertains to education. For instance, assuming a two parent family with a \$50,000 adjusted gross income and five family members in the home, the Federal Register indicates an expected family contribution of \$6,430 toward the student's education. Further assuming a tuition of \$9,000 the student would, in fact, be eligible for a \$2,500 loan.

Q What is the difference between the Student Loan and the Parent Loan Program?

A Unlike the Student Loan Program, the Parent Loan Program is available to any eligible employee regardless of family income. The loan is given to the parent and checks are made payable directly to the parent.

Q When would the Student Loan be due for repayment?

A The student's first payment is due on the first day of the sixth month following graduation, completion of termination of studies. Repayment can be made at a minimum of \$50 per month, but must be repaid within ten years following completion of studies.

Q When would the Parent Loan be due for repayment?

A Repayment for Parent Loans begins 60 days after disbursement of the check.

Q What is the procedure for applying for the Guaranteed Student/Guaranteed Parent Loan Programs?

A Basically, the same process is used for the Parent Loan as for the Student Loan, i.e., the eligible employee parent receives a loan application through their local Personnel Department, completes Section 1A of the application, the student completes Section 1B of that same application, has the school complete Section II of the application, and sends the application on to the bank for approval. The bank will then send the application to the United States Aid Funds to be guaranteed. The student or parent will be notified once final approval has been given.

Q My Local Personnel Department provided me with a Student and a Parent Loan application. Is it possible for my dependent child and I to both apply for loans?

A Yes. However, you may not borrow jointly in excess of the total estimated cost of education for any academic year.

The REMOS system features a foreign exchange trading software package -- the first in a series of software modules being developed by Bankers Trust. REMOS Foreign Exchange is designed for the "front office" part of trading -- the area that deals with decision support and the actual trading of currencies.

Utilizing standard networking capabilities of Digital's VAX family of computers, financial institutions will be able to link future REMOS modules with each other and with

their "back office" operations. This system will provide a fully integrated international trading system.

The REMOS Foreign Exchange Trading module totally automates the trading of foreign currencies, instantaneously providing dealers with all the information necessary to make trading decisions.

"REMOS was developed by and for Bankers Trust traders as a decision support system which will assist them in positioning themselves as a leader in the front office. Together with Digital we provide a truly state-of-the-art global trading system," said Michael Togher, vice president of Bankers Trust Information Services.

Digital sues Emulex Corporation for patent infringements

Digital has filed suit in U.S. District Court for the District of New Hampshire against Emulex Corporation of Costa Mesa, California, alleging patent infringements and seeking an injunction against further manufacturing, marketing, selling, and distribution of Emulex's disk controllers that utilize Digital's patented MSCP port protocol or plug into Digital's patented SBI, CMI, UNIBUS, and QBUS buses for its VAX, MicroVAX, and PDP-11 computer systems.

The suit specifically seeks a permanent injunction against Emulex Corporation to bar further manufacturing, marketing, distribution, and selling, of its VAX-, MicroVAX-, and PDP-11-compatible disk controllers that infringe these Digital patents and also seeks treble damages based on Digital's lost profits from Emulex's willful patent infringements.

This action taken by Digital demonstrates the company's long-standing policy and commitment to protect vigorously its innovations resulting from investments in research and development. Digital will continue to pursue aggressively patent infringement activity on a worldwide basis, as it has in suits involving Digital's VAX-11/780 memory boards, MASSBUS products, RL disks, and SBI interconnects. ■

Q My Local Personnel Department handed me a blank application. Assuming that I complete the application accurately, will I experience any problems with the processing of the application at the bank?

A Yes. Someone in your Local Personnel Department who is authorized to verify your eligibility *must* fill in your name as well as signing his/her own name to the application. Any application that is not verified will be returned to you by the bank.

Q I understand that Digital is currently dealing with four banks. Are all four banks providing Parent Loans?

A No. At this time only Lincoln First Bank and Chemical Bank are providing Parent Loans.

Q I have my application ready to go to the bank. Where should I send it?

A You may choose any one of the following banks:

Digital to supply \$8-million in equipment to NSF-funded consortium

Digital and the National Science Foundation (NSF) have announced an agreement for the acquisition of \$8 million in computer equipment for the NSF-funded John Von Neumann Center for Scientific Computing.

In conjunction with the NSF, the Center and its 12-school consortium will purchase from Digital \$8-million of VAX computer systems, networking communications equipment, 40 gigabytes of disk storage, and associated peripherals and services.

The center, named after computer pioneer and mathematician John von Neumann will house one of the most powerful supercomputers in the world. It will be able to perform 10 billion arithmetic operations (multiplications and additions) — or 10 gigaflops — every second. Academic researchers at

the participating consortium member schools will utilize the supercomputer's unique resources in the study of diverse fields such as protein structure, metallic phase transitions, and optimal fuel mixtures for automobile engines.

Schools participating in the consortium include: the University of Arizona, Brown University, University of Colorado, Harvard University, Institute for Advanced Study, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, New York University, University of Pennsylvania, Pennsylvania State University, Princeton University, University of Rochester, and Rutgers University.

Digital will provide a VAXcluster configuration of VAX 8600 systems and VAX-11/750 systems at the Von Neumann Cen-

ter. Each of the 12-member consortium schools will be linked to the Center's supercomputer via their own on-site VAX-11/750 system. Each VAX system will provide a transparent link to the Von Neumann Center, making the supercomputer appear to be based at each location.

"Digital's equipment will provide state-of-the-art communications with mass storage capabilities in a unique environment," said Steven Orszag, professor of applied and computational mathematics at Princeton and the Chairman of the Board of Trustees for the Consortium for Scientific Computing, Inc. "One of our major goals is to make accessing the supercomputer as easy as accessing a telephone network. We feel that the power of the 8600s will greatly facilitate that process," he said. ■

U.S. Army recognizes Digital's service

This service is available on RLO1, RLO2, RKO5, RKO6 and RKO7 cartridges. The disk packs covered are those designated for the RPO4, RPO5, RPO6, RMO2, RMO3, RMO5 and the RA60 disk drives.

Media Maintenance is a semi-annual cleaning and inspection process. Inspection checks for axial runout, radial runout and quality of surface condition. The cleaning process consists of cleaning the recording surfaces and the cartridge or cover plastic.

Media Maintenance can reduce head crashes, decrease hard and soft errors, prolong the life of the disk and reduce occurrence of lost data.
