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Digital taking active role in assisting African relief effort

Digital and its employees have taken active roles in helping to alleviate the famine in Ethiopia by donating approximately \$125,000 to organizations associated with the African relief effort.

In January, Digital gave \$10,000 to Oxfam America, collaborating with 12 other area corporations to raise a total of \$75,000 towards an airlift of food and supplies to Ethiopia.

Individual employees have donated \$57,243 to the cause, all of which was matched by Digital's Matching Gift program. Corporate Community Relations, which is coordinating the donations, in conjunction with the Los Angeles District contributed three Rainbow personal computers to U.S.A. for Africa. This new foundation, established by popular musicians such as Harry Belafonte, Lionel Richie and Michael Jackson, has raised nearly \$50 million for African relief through sales of their recording "We Are the World," and other efforts.

Oxfam America is a non-profit international development and disaster relief organization based in Boston. According to John Hammock, executive director, "Since a BBC (British Broadcasting Corporation)

film was shown on American television this past October on the famine in Ethiopia, there has been a dramatic increase in interest in the African relief effort from both the public and corporate sectors.

"The crisis in Oxfam & director

the result of drought but the underlying causes of that drought have to do with government policies in certain African countries which do not foster food production," he said.

Although Oxfam America has gained national notoriety for its support of the relief effort in Africa, the primary objective of the organization is to find ways to empower the underprivileged through education and by providing tools so they may enrich their lives. "This is a long-term commitment that is quite difficult. We have project officers that locate areas where help is needed, analyze how to work directly with those affect-

ed, and ultimately make an impact on some of the underlying causes of crisis situations," says John.

Oxfam America was begun in 1970 and is one of six autonomous Oxfam organizations worldwide. Its name is derived from the Oxford Committee for Famine Relief, which was founded in England in 1942. Oxfam America funds local, grass-roots groups in poor countries in Asia, Africa and Latin America. In the United States, Oxfam America works towards educating the public about the basic causes of poverty and world hunger. In the past six months, half of the \$13 million raised by Oxfam America has been earmarked for Africa.


DCU to move into new quarters this fall

Washington University and Digital announce \$15-million computer networking agreement

Washington University in St. Louis, Missouri and Digital have signed an agreement to develop a computing network for both the Hilltop and Medical campuses to support advanced picture communications as well as high speed text transmission.

A major theme of the agreement is the development of advanced professional workstations. Based on Digital's MicroVAX computer and tailored to the needs of the engineer, basic scientist, physician and educator, the workstations will be capable of transmitting pictures as well as symbols and graphs between the university's two campuses and several academic divisions.

Details of the agreement were outlined by Washington University Chancellor William H. Danforth and Dick Corley, Medical Systems Group manager for Digital.

The partnership agreement will enable Washington University to acquire \$15 million worth of Digital computing and networking resources at reduced cost over the next three years. In exchange, the university will provide Digital with technical expertise in using computers for education and research in a networked environment. The university also will act as a demonstration site for Digital products.

"Washington University is a national leader in computing," said Chancellor Danforth. "This agreement enables us to maintain that leadership in the important area of networking and advanced workstation development. We are grateful to Digital for the opportunity to acquire this excellent equipment."

Digital's Dick Corley noted: "For many years, Washington University has enjoyed a national leadership role in research and in the development of new technologies. Through this partnership, we hope to achieve a new level of computer integration

— one that will have many applications throughout higher education. The agreement reflects our mutual commitment to create an environment where students of many disciplines may access the latest computer technology. The faculty can simultaneously engage in academic research using fully-integrated equipment, and administrators can use one of the most advanced office automation systems available.

The project will build on Washington University's nearly two decades of computer network experience, which includes the recent installation of a prototype picture network. Ethernet local area networks will be integrated with a broad-band picture network. The picture network will support the digital transmission of video and text, as well as gray-scale and color images and simulated views of abstract two- and three-dimensional objects.

Hardware and software to be supported on the university's Medical and Hilltop Campuses will include Digital's MicroVAX workstations, VAX 8600 computer system, VAX-cluster system, DECrad radiology information system, IVIS (Interactive Video Information System), ALL-IN-1 office automation system, and DECmate office workstations.

Computer networking capabilities already exist between the University's Computing Facilities division and the Medical and Hill-top campuses, including local area networks within the Mallinckrodt Institute of Radiology, the School of Engineering, and the Department of Computer Science. But by 1988, the network is also expected to include many other medical school divisions, and departments from the college of Arts and Sciences.

The agreement will support the university in several joint projects with Digital.■




