'VAXcluster' concept offers highly increased power

A new concept in high-capacity computing power for VAX computer systems, called VAXcluster, was recently announced by Digital. It offers greatly increased levels of computing power, storage capacity, user support and system availability. VAXcluster, the new multisystem technology, permits a configuration of up to 16 VAX-11/780, VAX-11/782 and VAX-11/750 computers and intelligent storage subsystems to function outwardly as a single, large, highly powerful system.

David Chanoux, VAX Marketing Manager, called the new VAXcluster system concept "the most innovative, efficient and achievable path to high-performance, high-capacity computing in the industry. This new systems approach offers cluster-wide data sharing and software tools to ensure data integrity and higher system availability. It is, in simplest form, the new way to grow systems."

VAXcluster systems will enable users to access data stored anywhere in the cluster as if they were local, avoiding the delays and software overhead of conventional

network transmission. Cluster configurations will also support external and internal communication through DECnet interfaces and local-area, multiple-device access across Ethernet links.

VAXcluster systems are designed for interactive and batch applications in commercial and educational fields involving large databases and timesharing for large numbers of terminal users. In engineering and scientific areas VAXcluster systems will improve performance in data acquisition and reduction, statistical and structural analysis, and multiuser, interactive design projects requiring large programs, storage capacity, and much computer-intensive activity.

VAXcluster components

Hardware components of a VAXcluster system include VAX-11/780, VAX-11/782 and VAX-11/750 processors; a dual-path Computer Interconnect (CI) bus; an intelligent CI interface for each processor; a Start Coupler for physical interconnection of processors and storage subsystems;

and a mass storage controller, which consists of an HSC50 intelligent subsystem with associated disk storage devices.

Cluster operation will be managed under new versions of the VMS operating system to be released beginning this spring. The first phase will include two releases of VMS software: the first supports clusters of VAX-11/780 and VAX-11/782 processors and HSC50 subsystems with RA60/RA80-/RA81 disk storage; each HSC50 controller supports up to four processors. The second extends support to the VAX-11/750.

Future releases of VMS software will take full advantage of the VAXcluster potential for data protection and fault tolerance. They will provide the capability to survive and reconfigure around the failure of individual nodes, as well as facilities to ensure that data stored in a cluster remains in a known state. The combination of these features will allow users to develop environments with high levels of both availability and integrity of data files.

Digital honored by Town of Maynard

The Town of Maynard held a celebration last month to let Ken Olsen and Digital know "we appreciate what you've done for Maynard."

On April 19, declared "Ken Olsen Day" by the Town Selectmen, tributes from municipal, civic and business groups were made at a dinner honoring Digital's 25th anniversary and Ken Olsen.

The evening began with a presentation by town officials at the site of the town's first meeting place, Riverside Hall (now Gruber Brothers Furniture Store).

Chairman of the Board of Selectmen Robert Gilligan opened the day by declaring the week of April 19 to April 25 "Digital Equipment Corporation Week."

John Tobin, chairman of the Board of Public Works, presented Ken with a plaque that proclaimed "Ken Olsen Day" in Maynard, the "mini-computer capital of the world."

Thomas Sheridan, superintendent of Public Works announced that part of the intersection of Walnut and Main Streets will be renamed Kenneth Olsen Plaza, and a

Digital announces 'IVIS' system for computer-based education

Digital has now entered into the system-based education and training market with a multimedia "video learning station" that incorporates a new hardware/software option for the Professional 350 personal computer. The Interactive Video Information System (IVIS) integrates moving or still television pictures with computer-generated text and graphics on the Professional 350 color monitor.

To support the entry, Digital also announced programs for courseware development, courseware acquisition and consulting services.

The IVIS option enables the Professional 350 personal computer to combine natural video images (NTSC-TV or RS170) with text and graphic overlays and synchronized sound. The result is a dynamic, interactive presentation that enhances the user's interest level and rate of retention.

The option accepts two external video sources such as videodisc, videotape, video camera or other live video devices. The system will control several models of industrial laser videodisc players. Two selectable audio inputs are provided, allowing use of stereophonic soundtracks or bilingual narration. An audio output capability is also available through the Professional 350's optional Telephone Management System (TMS).

Because of the superior video characteristics of the Professional 350 RGB (Red/Green/Blue) color monitor, the system displays television pictures with a resolution approximately six times better than that of home television sets. Along with high-resolution text and graphics, the image quality enables the systems to highlight complex detail and simplify its presentation for the user. For review or retesting, the IVIS system can recall and display at random any of the 54,000 frames stored on a videodisc.

Interactive, efficient learning

The IVIS system was developed primarily to satisfy the training requirements of industrial, governmental, military and educa-

tional organizations. As an educational tool, it enables self-paced, interactive learning in which students can observe simulations of real-life situations, solve problems on-line, and receive immediate guidance and reinforcement. To achieve cost and time efficiency, it offers decentralized, local instruction to save per diem and travel expenses.

Besides general purpose and technical training, the IVIS-equipped Professional 350 computer is designed for diverse uses such as point-of-purchase advertising, public information delivery, television and audio-visual media production. Along with its broad new functionality, the system also retains full capability as a Professional 350 desktop personal computer.

The IVIS option consists of five modules and an external analog box that attaches to the back of the Professional system unit's floor stand. Three of the modules — the IVIS bit map video module, IVIS extended bit map module, and IVIS system module — are inserted into the Professional 350 option module cage; the other

two are housed in the analog box. The IVIS option also includes cables, power supply, universal power control and a software device driver. The five-megabyte hard disk option for the Professional 350 computer is recommended for most applications using IVIS.

As with all Professional series components, all parts of the IVIS system are designed for installation by the customer and require no tools for assembly.

"The IVIS learning station presents a non-threatening environment in which the student controls the learning pace and enjoys a safe outlet for trial and error," says Del Lippert, manager of Educational Services. "The trainee can even respond to managers or course developers by typing in comments and questions."

"IVIS systems are being used today to train our own Field Service engineers to install and repair equipment. Our experience indicates that retention is increased and learning is more effective than with traditional methods of self-paced instruction," Del said.

Terminals Manufacturing to become Low End Manufacturing

Terminals Manufacturing is being replaced by Low End Manufacturing, an organization composed of three product groups — Video, Printers and Small Systems — and the Low End Business Center. The changes are being made in order to focus on diverse markets and to permit clearer linkages with design engineering, the Far East and Europe.

According to Dick Esten, Low End Manufacturing manager, "The Product Groups will focus on the development and implementation of worldwide marketing strategies which deliver competitive products and reflect the uniqueness of various

markets." The three groups will also determine the manufacturing capacity needed in different parts of the world.

Bob Hopley will be the Printer Group Product manager with line responsibility for Phoenix. Bruce Anderson will be the Video Product Group manager with responsibility for Albuquerque. Fred Forsyth will head up the Small Systems Product Group with line responsibility for Boston and Westfield.

Dawn Greeley will continue as the Low End Business Center manager handling products from all groups and Dave Spratt will continue as Low End Manufacturing controller.

bandstand will be built there at a later date.

Ken also received a plaque from Historical Commission chairman Ralph Sheridan who thanked Ken for "his keen interest in the historical values of the town" in particular the restoration of the Mill.

At the dinner, held at Alphonse's Powder Mill Restaurant, some 600 Maynard residents were joined by federal, state and local officials and dignitaries, who continued to shower Ken with plaques, proclamations and praise.

"All too often cities and towns take industry for granted," said Selectman Al Burke. "That is not true in Maynard. We take great pride in our industry, especially Digital." Selectman Burke, a key member of the Appreciation Committee, noted the gratitude felt toward Digital by a number of organizations. He pointed out that Digital has matched employee's contributions to the Maynard Community Chest, with donations totaling some \$370,000 during the last 15 years.

"Our efforts to revitalize the downtown could not have gotten off the ground if it weren't for Digital providing seed money for grants. Just last year, our high school, through efforts of Digital, received its own computer system."

He concluded, "In all, during the past 10 to 15 years, Digital and its employees have contributed more than \$1 million to the Town of Maynard and kept it very quiet."

Leo Mullin, chairman of the Council on Aging, pointed out that "in nearly ever survey of services needed for the elderly and handicapped, transportation is at the top."

And in Maynard, he noted, the elderly are transported with a van donated by Digital, which was recently replaced by another van the company gave the council three years ago.

George McGown, president of the Will Dodd Community Center, which Digital supports, announced that the computer room will be renamed the Ken Olsen Room.

Former Gov. King said Ken Olsen exemplifies the "do-it-yourself" attitude that makes the United States the greatest nation in the world. He added, "Massachusetts and thousands of families in our commonwealth, are so much better off because of Digital and what it represents."

Federal representative James Shannon had asked the flag over the U.S. Capital be flown in honor of Ken Olsen. He then presented Ken with the flag.

"A rising tide lifts all boats and there's no better place to see that than at Digital," Rep. Shannon said.

Eligibility for admittance to the Accelerated Program is evaluated on the basis of a student's performance on the qualifying examination, experience, and scholastic records.

All applicants must take a four-hour qualifying examination covering the humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences. Students who qualify for admission to the program enroll in three specially designed, year-long seminars, one in each of the three major academic disciplines: humanities, social sciences and natural sciences. These three year-long seminars (24 credits) may be taken sequentially or concurrently, and must be completed with no less than a B- average. The seminars, plus a 4-credit mathematics course and a 4-credit computer science course, will supplant the traditional sixteen freshman-sophomore courses (64 credits).

The Accelerated Program Qualifying Examination is a two-day examination and students must be in attendance both days. The examination will be administered according to the following schedule:

Employee's first program tracks canoe race

Sometimes the best way to learn something new is to dive in and do it. This is what Bob Whitehead, Corporate Investment manager, did when he volunteered to write a program to track the Charles River Canoe Race and Tour for the non-profit Charles River Watershed Association.

Having never programmed before, he learned how to program a Professional 350 in ProBASIC through trial and error, with the assistance of Digital's Telephone Support Center in Atlanta. The program he created was able to manage the administrative work involved with the 400 race entrants. It collected their times, produced address labels, sorted them and printed results the moment the race ended.

The race was organized to increase the awareness of the Charles River as a recreational resource and to raise funds to support the Watershed Association's continuing work in promoting the river's improvement and protection.

While Bob is a neophyte programmer, programming is second nature to his 17-year-old son John, who once even taught a programming class for adults.

"John was originally asked to write the program but he didn't have time," Bob explains. With help from John and from fellow Digital employees, Bob was able to write the program over a three month period in his spare time. Throughout the process, Bob consulted Spence Keller in Treasury and Brad Williams at the Personal Computer Hotline in Atlanta for help with the Professional.

"I jumped in not realizing the magnitude of the task. I was lucky I had John and Brad to fall back on. In fact, Brad served alternatively as my programming aide and psychiatrist during the low points of the project. While the 350 is a superb product, it's still obviously new and needs to be mastered from a software standpoint. My experience and perspective as an amateur hopefully added to the company's educational process as well as my own. I am certain that we now can make better judgments about how to use personal computers in the Investment Department," Bob says.

Computer Architecture Course examines design alternatives

The architecture of a computer is determined by the technological, economic and human aspects of the environment in which the computer is designed and built. There can be several different implementations of an architecture, each using different components but each providing exactly the same interface to the user.

A design must not only take these factors into account, it must also be flexible enough to allow for evolution and refinement of the design. This course will examine the alternatives leading to different designs. Some of the topics to be studied include computer architecture evolution, instruction sets (e.g., RISC and CISC), single and multi-user computer systems, supercomputers, sequencing (e.g. data versus control flow), design methodology (e.g., simulation, verification, and validation), and some interesting non-standard architectures.
