Falcon targeted for OEM applications

Digital unveils industry's smallest single-board microcomputer

President Ken Olsen officially introduced the computer industry's smallest 16-bitwordlength single-board computer (SBC) at the Annual Meeting held Nov. 5. The compact size of Falcon SBC-11/21 makes it ideally suited for build-in applications by Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) where space is at a premium. The new low-end member of Digital's microcomputer family is priced at \$521 in quantities of 100. First deliveries begin next month.

According to Jack MacKeen, Microcomputer Products Group manager, the Falcon SBC-11/21 provides designers with the ver and flexibility of 16-bit-wordlength incrocomputers, yet is priced competitively with 8-bit-wordlength single-board computers. "We are targeting the new board toward the market space traditionally held by 8-bit boards. Falcon brings full 16-bit computer power to application areas where cost and size — what we call form factor — previously made it impractical to use the longer-wordlength microcomputers."

Mighty Micro runs New York Marathon

The new Falcon SBC-11/21 is aimed at dedicated read-only memory (ROM)-based applications in such areas as laboratory instrumentation, manufacturing monitoring and control, process control, robotics, and medical devices. Dimensions of Falcon are 13.2 X 22.8 cm, enabling integration into instruments and control machinery where space is critical. The Falcon SBC-11/21 interfaces to the LSI-11 microcomputer bus and is the low-end member of Digital's microcomputer family.

The T-11 Chip

The heart of the new single-board micro is the T-11 chip designed and manufactured by Digital's Semiconductor Engineering Group in Hudson. T-11 employs the latest MOS/LSI (metal oxide silicon/large continued on page two

OFFICE PLUS solidly establishes Digital in office automation market

OFFICE PLUS, Digital's comprehensive office automation program, was officially introduced to financial and computer industry press, the sales force, and customers at a major press conference and nine-city teleconference held October 29 in Wakefield, Mass.

OFFICE PLUS is the company's concept and marketing strategy for standalone or integrated work and data processing, text management, communication and service.

Calling OFFICE PLUS "one of the most significant announcements the company has ever made," President Ken Olsen said. "The office is the next logical step in bringing computing capabilities into another area of an organization where computers can be used efficiently and cost effectively." He said the company views 'the office' as a focal point where information from other parts of the organization -- the factory, the field sales office, the distribution center, and the laboratory -- can be brought together.

The event was also the occasion for the announcement of DECmail, Digital's advanced electronic mail system and a component of OFFICE PLUS. DECmail and

other OFFICE PLUS products -- DECmate, DECword, DECword/DP, DECset, and DECtype, work in conjunction with Digital's communication capabilities.

One of the key building blocks of OF-FICE PLUS is DECnet. DECnet encompasses the software products, protocols, interfaces and support systems which enable Digital computers, in a distributed processing network, to communicate with each other.

Julius Marcus, vice president, group manager, stressed the fact that OFFICE PLUS products are deliverable to customer sites immediately. "We have made it possible today to provide data processing, work processing, electronic mail, and business graphics to a large variety of users all from one terminal while insuring customer investments, and providing customized installations, training and service functions," Julius said.

Vice President, US Area Sales, Ed Kramer said, "With VAX Information Architecture and OFFICE PLUS, we're reaching out to individuals within departments -- the secretaries, managers, clerks, and re-

continued from page one scale integration) semiconductor technology. The chip contains the equivalent of 13,000 transistors on a silicon area about four one-hundredths of a square inch in area. It is instruction-set compatible with the world's most popular minicomputer, the PDP-11.

Falcon SBC-11/21 programming

The programs for the Falcon SBC-11/21 can be developed on any PDP-11 computer using the MACRO 11 assembly language or the new MicroPower/Pascal software. Developed and debugged application programs are then loaded into the Falcon SBC-11/21, typically by blasting them into some form of ROM, usually EPROM.

Careful! Somebody may be listening

Part Two

Information leaks cost industry two or three billion dollars a year, according to the estimates of several authorities. To minimize Digital's contribution to that needless waste, it's important that all employees be aware of the value of much of the information they deal with at work and of the dangers implicit in its misuse.

"We all need reminding from time to time about how to handle confidential information and of the risks in trading Digital stock when possessing inside information," says Bob Steinbach of the Law Department in Maynard.

Accordingly, here is the company policy on insider trading:

It is essential, in the interest of all concerned (including potential sellers of Digital stock, current investors, as well as Digital vendors, customers and employees), that material information relating to Digital business and financial matters be maintained in the strictest confidence until a full and coordinated disclosure is made to the business and investment community.

Not only is this a good and fair business practice, but failure to adhere to this practice may lead to both company and personal liability.

Two areas of concern that Digital shares with all major companies are:

- Timely disclosure of material company information
- Insider trading

The following guidelines are applicable to

Manufacturing VP to work with Engineering

Jack will continue to carry his Manufacturing responsibilities during his temporary stay in Engineering.

all employees:

No employee shall disclose "material information" relating to company matters (information to which in investor would attach importance in deciding whether to purchase or sell the company's stock) to either non-employees or employees who have no need to know the information, until the information has been effectively disclosed in a manner sufficient to ensure its availability to the investing community as a whole.

The U.S. Supreme Court has defined material information as information which a "...reasonable investor might have considered...important in making his or her (investment) decision." This would obviously include such items as a significant event or changes concerning markets or products, information concerning corporate budgets or forecasts, earnings or dividend determinations, significant contracts, changes in management, litigation, financial plans, etc.

A director, officer or employee possessing material information (insider) must abstain from trading securities while material information of which he or she has knowledge remains undisclosed to the investment community. It is important that insiders make no favorable or unfavorable recommendations relative to Digital common stock to outsiders.

Transfer of shares will be monitored to assure compliance with this policy.

The board is responsible for setting policy; establishing and approving budgets; approving expenditures; authorizing and reviewing investments; planning for long-term developmental needs; and reviewing financial and operation reports.

Candidates not selected by the nominating committee may run by petition. Petitions will be available after the first of the year. To run by petition, candidates must collect the signatures of one percent of DCU's membership, approximately 350 names.

To prepare the field sales force for OF-FICE PLUS, a two-week Sales Training effort took three training teams to 16 U.S. cities and Toronto prior to the teleconference.

DCU votes bonus dividend

Digital Credit Union's dividend for the fourth quarter of 1981 has been increased from 6½ percent to 8 percent, a one-time bonus, according to Richard Mangone, general manager. The dividend applies to regular savings, Vacation Club, Christmas Club and U-Name-It Club accounts.

The dividend was voted by the board of directors to show the credit union's appreciation for the support shown by the Digital community to the young financial institution. All funds in the accounts mentioned on deposit from Oct. 1, 1981 through Dec. 31, 1981 will qualify for the bonus dividend, which is compounded daily and will be paid on Dec. 31.

In dollars, the dividend means that an additional \$50,000 will be distributed to the membership. DCU paid \$650,000 in dividends for the third quarter.

"Savings are the backbone of DCU," said Richard, "Members, who save regularly through payroll deduction, are the reason DCU has grown to \$45 million in 18 months. Without the savers, DCU would not be able to offer the programs, services and conveniences that we do.

"The bonus dividend is in the true spirit of the credit union movement. Credit Unions by philosophy return all profit to the membership. The bonus dividend and DCU's low loan rates do just that."

The OFFICE PLUS products

DECmate — A multipurpose Work Processor[®] system, designed for small businesses, professionals and individual business applications in large corporations.

DECmate uses data processing software and an enhanced version of Digital's word processing software; it performs list processing, alphabetic and numeric sort and communications.

DECword — A PDP-11/34 packaged system which provides multi-user word processing for up to eight users, DECword is targeted to those making extensive use of word processing such as corporate departments. DECword features an interactive computer based training module that allows users to train at their own pace while using the DECword software.

DECword DP — A layered application software product for data processing customers who want word and data processing capabilities. Digital's first RSTS/E-based timesharing word processing application, DECword/DP also features an interactive computer based training module that allows users to train at their own pace while using the DECword software.

DECset — An information management system designed to integrate publishing into a corporation's office automation strategy, DECset is typically used by inhouse printing departments.

Supported by a company's 32-bit VAX hardware, VMS virtual memory operating system and DECnet communications, DECset software provides users with the ability to integrate word and data processing with in-plant publishing functions such as phototypesetting.

DECtype 300 — A layered word processing application designed to run concurrently with data processing applications on the DEC Datasystem 300 series of computers. DECtype 300 is written in the DIBOL language to provide integrated data processing and word processing for small business and departmental use.

DECmail — A layered application software product, DECmail offers electronic mail and filing capabilities on a VAX/VMS system for secretaries, managers and professionals. Using DECmail, documents may be created to be mailed and printed or for administrative use, such as for calendars, phone lists, and "to-do" lists.

Legislation delays student loans

After you have decided to make the commitment to take an educational loan, processing delays can be frustrating, disappointing and downright maddening.

United States Aid Fund (USA Funds), which processes loans for Digital employees, has reported that the overwhelming volume of applications and new legislation resulted in long delays in the loan process.

The publicity of the proposed governmental budget cuts sent students running to get their applications "in under the wire" -- before the legislation was enacted.

There have been many complaints and accusations that lending institutions held up loans so they could collect the origination fee -- an addition to the Guaranteed Student Loan Program.

First of all, the origination fee, 5 percent of the principal amount of the loan, is paid to the Federal Department of Education to reduce expenses in running the program, not to the banks. The lender deducts the amount of the fee from the loan proceeds: e.g., a student applying for a \$2,500 loan will receive a check for \$2,375, the lender retains 5 percent or \$125 for the federal government.

Secondly, legislation surprised everyone by making the cut-off for exemption to this fee back to August 23, 1981. At this time the student had to have promissory note in hand, regardless of when the loan was applied for.

USA Funds and other organizations tried to get Washington to postpone changes until Oct. 1, 1981. But in fact, the Department of Education gave only two weeks notice before imposing the new regulation.

Many lending institutions and schools delayed processing so they would not have to reprocess loans if the rules were changed in the middle of the procedure.

The Postsecondary Student Assistance Amendment of 1981 includes eliminating separate loan limits for independent students. The loan limits, for loans completed on or after Oct. 1, 1981, stand as:

F&A announces new Financial Development Program

For a growing company like Digital, the increasing demand for financial professionals dictates the need for a perpetual pool of highly qualified financial personnel. Benefits begins health awareness campaign

Health care costs in the U.S. are rising at an alarming rate. Each year, medical benefit premiums for Digital employees increase between 15 and 20 percent.

"We need to raise the awareness of Digital employees on health issues," says John Rosala, Corporate Health Care Planning manager. "Good health is not only in the best interest of employees as individuals, it also helps the company by maintaining a healthy, productive workforce."

As an initial step in increasing health awareness, all U.S. employees and retirees will receive a 1982 health oriented wall calendar in December. The calendar, produced by Corporate Benefits, is part of Digital's on-going effort to sensitize employees to major health issues, especially as they affect lifestyle habits.

Each month of the calendar is devoted to a different health care topic, such as nutrition, pregnancy, heart disease and stress. Other months highlight exercise, hypertension, alcoholism, drug abuse, safety, immunizations and cancer.

As part of the health awareness effort throughout the company, many of the Digital Health Services Departments are planning health education programs based on the themes of the calendar.

But not only will you be able to get some healthy information from the calendar, you will also be able to pick up some reminders on benefits, like when you should start thinking about enrolling in the Employee Stock Purchase Plan and when the 1982 Digital holidays are scheduled.

Digital intends to expand its educational campaign on health. But for the moment, watch for the calendar in early December and start your own health awareness campaign.

Dates set for holiday turkey distribution

It's a Digital tradition. Each year during the winter holiday season, Digital gives each employee a 12 to 14 pound turkey hen. Over 35,000 turkeys will be distributed this year in New England alone. Distribution will be from December 1 to 16.

Employees will receive keypunch cards with their paychecks on the Thursday prior to the actual date of distribution for their site. For example, employees in Northboro will receive their special keypunch cards on Nov. 26 in time for the Dec. 2 delivery date. You must present this card to receive your turkey.

If you prefer, you may donate your turkey to charity. Simply write CHARITY on the face of the card and deposit it in one of the collection boxes that will be located in each facility. These turkeys will be donated to local agencies for distribution.

If you are unable to pick up your turkey, please make arrangements for someone to do it for you. Corporate Employee Activities, who coordinate this yearly project, does not have the freezer space to store turkeys.

Posters will announce the exact location, date and time that employees may pick up their turkeys.

University of Massachusetts School of Engineering is offering two new courses through its Videotape Instructional Program. A UMass representative will be at the Mill on Jan. 5-6 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Advanced Computer Graphics and Computer-Aided Design

This three graduate credit course emphasizes raster graphics, hidden surface algorithms and data structures for picture files as well as an exploration of various graphics packages. The videotaped program will also cover computer-aided design (CAD); important vender CAD systems and software packages; and the design of applications programs that apply to CAD tasks.

Prerequisites are Introduction to Interactive Computer Graphics or equivalent and experience in writing applications programs that incorporate significant graphics.

Advanced Computer Architecture/Very Large Scale Integration

Computer system design is changing rapidly toward the utilization of very large scale integrated circuitry in place of the traditional gate and register design methodology. This change is requiring a new way of thinking for the computer architect in cost tradeoffs and in the consideration of nontraditional architectures.

Prerequisites for the three graduate credit course are Computer Architecture I or instructor's permission and a logic design course or equivalent experience.
