Digital reports 38 percent revenue gain in second quarter

Digital released its sales and earnings results for the second quarter of its fiscal year ending June 27, 1981.

For the second quarter ended Dec. 27, 1980, the company reported total operating revenues of \$762,312,000 up 38 percent from the \$553,896,000 recorded in the comparable period a year ago. Net income for the quarter was up 30 percent and totaled \$69,978,000 or \$1.43 per share on 52,317,739 average common and common equivalent shares outstanding versus \$53,932,000 or \$1.21 per share on 45,818, 154 average common and common equivalent shares outstanding last year.

Acoustics Lab opens

The Product Acoustics Group in Environmental Engineering has opened its new acoustics lab at the Mill. This group led by Bob Lotz is responsible for the technological development in acoustical design throughout the corporation and the testing of products in strict accordance to Digital's and external standards.

In product development, the group performs analytical and experimental studies of vibration and sound in the early stages of a product's physical design. For example, air movers such as fans and blowers are tested in special rigs for noise emission.

38 percent revenue gain

For six months ending Dec. 27, 1980, Digital has reported total operating revenues of \$1,416,682,000 versus \$1,041,434,000 in the prior year. Net income for the half was \$126,182,000 or \$2.60 per share against \$99,171,000 or \$2.23 per share a year ago. Average common and common equivalent shares outstanding were 52,239,165 compared to 45,732,800 average common and common equivalent shares outstanding in the same period last year.

President Ken Olsen attributed strong second quarter revenue growth of 38 percent to continued worldwide demand for Digital's products and services. He said, "Both end users and Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEM) contributed to this substantial revenue gain. Our technical and commercial OEM business was particularly strong." He also said that customer demand was seen throughout Digital's broad product line and was notably strong for Digital's 32-bit VAX computers, the VAX-11/780 and the recently announced VAX-11/750.

"We are closely watching economic trends and conditions throughout the world. Despite slowing economies in Western Europe and record interest rates in the U.S., order rates remain on plan. Our substantial investment in plant and equipment continued during the quarter with spending of approximately \$77,000,000. Our \$400 million capital spending program is progressing on plan and should allow us to meet projected customer demand for our products into the mid 1980s.

Improved manufacturing efficiencies, increased production and added capacity accounted for reduced product delivery times during the quarter. This trend is expected to continue. The company plans to maintain high inventory levels in order to sustain substantial production growth throughout the remainder of the fiscal year," said Ken Olsen.

fit comfortably into today's and tomorrow's markets," said Bob.

"Now that this laboratory is operating, the corporation has the necessary resources to support our staff's efforts to develop acoustically successful products. But the Product Acoustics staff must be on the product team at the start. Otherwise the job is very difficult, sometimes impossible."

At a ribbon cutting ceremony in December, Ken Olsen said, "Having groups that truly understand the many characteristics of each of our products is important. That goes for sound, heat, electrical noise, radiation, power line noise; we have to understand all of them.

"The real challenge is to work as hard as we can to make the best products. Each one of us has to apply our own special skills to make sure that no one can touch us."

Gordon Bell, vice president,
Central Engineering, who also
participated in the ceremony,
said, "I really want to support this
effort like crazy. It is essential
that we get our products quieter.
There are some products out
there now that still need improvement in terms of being acceptable in the office environment.
And we certainly have aspirations
about putting a terminal next to
every person in an organization
and putting one in every office
space.

"It doesn't mean we don't have fine products now. But it is a very competitive world, and the lack of noise in products is an important attribute."

The acoustics lab includes two testing rooms for design development and evaluation as well as space for general laboratory functions

One room with its instrumentation helps the staff to determine the total amount of acoustical power radiated from a product or component or mechanism. The other supports detailed diagnostic measurements.

The two test rooms have controlled temperature and humidity

levels to keep to standards during testing. The rooms provide very quiet conditions.

Environmental Engineering Manager Frank Grimaldi pointed out that the cinder blocks used to construct the rooms have had the cavities filled with grout to create the correct dynamic mass in the walls. Then every crack and seam was sealed. Even the paint performs a function by giving the walls the right response to sound waves.

Because of the low clearance on the ground floor of Building two at the Mill, they had to dig down into the soil to get the space to shoehorn the test labs into place. The Acoustics Group did the functional and acoustical design of the lab. Joe McCoy and John Teske under Tony Miraglia, Plant Engineering, turned the design into working drawings and supervised construction.
