# Employee stock purchase price announced


The Employee Stock Purchase Plan has announced the purchase price for stock purchased for employees on Dec. 1, 1981. The buy price was \$77.75. The Fair Market Value on June 1 was \$110. and on November 30, \$91.44. The purchase price was based on the lower price less 15 percent.

Statements of Ownership and Stock Certificates will be mailed the first week of December to employees who participated in the June payment period. The rollover amount will show in your pay stubs the second week of December.

Employees who are participating in the December 1981 payment period had their first deduction taken from their pay on December 3.

The Supplementary Contribution for the December payment period will be \$77.75 and will begin on January 14, 1982. Anyone wishing to elect the Supplementary Contribution must do so no later than December 10. All forms are available from your Personnel Services Administrator (PSA).

Employees who participated in the June Payment Period made 17.6 percent on their investment. 232,158 shares of Digital common stock were issued to employees for the June payment period.



# igital and Boston Schools train unemployed

Project MASS (Manufacturing Assembly and Soldering Skills) is a special collaborative of Digital, Boston Public Schools and the State Department of Education to train unemployed adults for entry into the computer industry.

The program, held at the Humphrey Occupational Resource Center, is presently training 20 people for light assembly and manufacturing. Trainees were recruited through community based organizations and public agencies.

Digital assisted the center in planning the curriculum. Since the classes are parttime and in the evening, the project was able to hire Noelle Davis, a Digital employee, as an instructor.

Digital donated surplus circuit boards which trainees use in practicing soldering and assembly operations.

The first class will be ready for employment in November. The Humphrey Center, which opened one year ago in Roxbury, Mass., operates skills training programs for 2600 Boston High School students during the day.

Since the Boston School Department eliminated Adult Basic Education prorams, the Humphrey Center has started the project for adults and hopes to continue with the support of industry and public funding.

# Digital supports graduate program

The Women in Engineering Program at Northeastern University provides graduate education in electrical engineering and computer science for women with undergraduate degrees in natural sciences.

Steve Ching, Large Systems CAD, and Al Hsia, 32-Bit Systems Group, are being paid by Digital to teach part-time at Northeastern in support of the program.

Russ Johnson, manager of U.S. College Relations, says industry support of innovative college program is becoming more common. "With the prospect of declining enrollments and decreasing support from federal and state governments, colleges are increasingly relying on support from industry."

Digital reprsentatives who have been instrumental in promoting the program are Dick Clayton, vice president, Manufacturing Technology; Bill Demmer, vice president, 32-Bit Systems; Jane Goring, College Relations supervisor for Central Engineering; and Bill Johnson, Central Software Engineering Group manager.

pigital recently announced its lowest-cost inter with letter-quality copy. Called Letterprinter 100, the new lightweight, desktop printer features the highest speed impact dot matrix printing rate of Digital's printer family, a new higher-resolution draft copy mode and graphics output in addition to letter-quality printing.

According to William D. Hogan, product manager, the new printer is targeted to Original Equipment Manufacturers (OEMs) and system designers who require maximum printing flexibility in economical configurations. "The multifaceted Letterprinter 100 provides a user with a wide variety of outputs, satisfying the majority of hardcopy needs for most applications with a single printer. This arrangement simplifies the design of word-processing and business-oriented computer systems, both by saving space and overall system costs, he said. He added that configuring systems with fewer printers also simplifies system maintenance routines.

Market areas for the Letterprinter 100 include conventional small and medium-sized computer systems, personal computers, and small business computer and word processing systems. The terminal is ideally suited for use as a companion printer for those video terminals with local rinter output facilities. For word processing users, the Letterprinter 100 provides draft copies at 240 characters per second, memorandum-quality copies at 80 characters per second, and letter-quality copies at 30 characters per second on the same terminal.



# UMass introduces series for manufacturing engineering

Beginning in February, the School of Engineering at the University of Massachusetts is offering a series of live and videotaped courses for the manufacturing engineering in mechanical, industrial, electrical and computer engineering.

Courses taught live will be held in the Rte. 128 area once a week from 4:30 to 7:30 for 14 weeks. Faculty are resident graduate instructors from the School of Engineering, UMass-Amherst.

Videotaped courses are recorded on the Amherst campus with resident graduate faculty before a live student audience. Each class is recorded on a 3/4 inch video cassette and shipped weekly with handouts, homework assignments and examinations to Digital facilities. With playback equipment provided by the employee's site, the student may view tapes alone or in small groups.

Faculty at UMass has reserved telephone office hours for questions. Courses last up to 14 weeks and equal three UMass graduate or undergraduate credits and may be applied to a degree program at UMass. They are usually transferable to other institutions. A University of Massachusetts representative will be at the Mill on Jan. 5 and 6 from 10-2.
